Pastoral Care

“A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this will all men know that you are my disciples, if you love one another.” John 13:35-36

Jesus said that people would know we are his followers by the way we love one another. This is our responsibility as Christians being brought together by God in the same family here at Christ the King & St Augustine's. In such a large Parish we have to work hard at caring for each other. So how do we do this?

It's the role of all members of our Parish to care for each other and a lot of pastoral care is done through outreach groups mentioned in this leaflet

We are able to offer pastoral support to people through the Pastoral Care, Bereavement Team, Marriage Care, Life, Justice and Peace, Legion of Mary, St Vincent de Paul, Knights of St Columba, and the Pioneers.

Pastoral Care Group

The Pastoral Care Group are volunteers who visit people that are sick or housebound or live in Care Homes. They visit both Catholics and Non-Catholics on request and in a spirit of trust and confidentiality. It is usually a short, friendly and regular visit. All Pastoral Care volunteers have been CRB checked and carry an identity card. Parishioners who are no longer able to join the community for Sunday Mass welcome a visit and so feel connected to our Parish. As volunteers they value their ministry and find it very rewarding. If you know anyone who would like a visit please let us know.

The Sacrament of Anointing

Parishioners who have a serious illness or are planning to have major surgery, are encouraged to contact the parish priest before they are hospitalised in order to receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick.

Question: Is the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick just for those at imminent risk of death?

Answer: No! The anointing of the sick is administered to bring spiritual and even physical strength during an illness, especially near the time of death. However, it is not only received in the case of imminent death. If you have a serious illness and/or are about to undergo major surgery the Church strongly encourages you to seek the grace of this sacrament.

Bereavement Team

The Bereavement Team are volunteers who are available to visit and support those who have been bereaved. The team are a small discreet group of specially trained parishioners who offer a confidential listening ear and an opportunity to share some of your grief.

Home visits for the sick

We aim for all parishioners who are housebound, permanently or temporarily to be visited by a priest or Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion on a regular basis. If you are ill and/or housebound, or have a relative or friend who is, please let us know, who will, if you wish, arrange for one of the ministers to visit.

Sudden Critical Sickness

Please call the Presbytery. Every effort will be made in responding to emergency sick calls. These being where a friend or relative is thought to be at risk of imminent death. Once this situation is known and if needed, you have called emergency services, please contact us on 765916181 if you want a priest to attend to administer the Last Rites (also known as Sacrament of the Sick or Anointing of the Sick).

Going into Hospital

The data protection act now means that the old practice of hospitals providing information to hospital chaplains and parish priests about Catholics who are patients no longer takes place automatically. Due to this new law, parish priests and hospital chaplains may not know a catholic has been admitted to hospital.

You are reminded that if you or friend/relative are admitted to hospital or residential home you need to make sure the hospital/home records that you are a Catholic. You need to make an explicit request that the Catholic Chaplain and/or parish priest is informed. This applies to all patients of any age. It is hoped that parishioners will avail themselves of this wonderful sacrament and do everything they can to encourage sick friends and relatives to receive it.
